In February 2019, **Art Salvage** was one of three non-profits receiving attention, love, and cash from **STCU** and **KREM 2**.


Their partnership program, "Who Do You Love?" invited people in the community to vote for their favorite charity; Art Salvage earned third place and \$1.000!


2019 BOARD of DIRECTORS

* Net operating revenue is used to fund our growth into a bigger, better reuse center





Rescues from the Waste Stream

This is our key mission. We collect and curate usable materials from the waste stream—and then make those items available for reimagination and repurpose.

We calculate donations by weight, and 2019 saw a 32% increase in materials received, represented by 725 separate donations.
